Sunil Davidson: Climbing the Highest Peaks

Sunil Davidson, who served in the Budget Section of the Division of Financial and Administrative Management in New York, passed away in March, having worked at UNICEF since 1979. He is remembered here by colleagues (full remarks are posted on the Staff News Intranet site):

Jeanette Besosa: I'm convinced that he's thrilled that he has reached the highest mountain and crossed the widest

waters. It was an honour to have known him. I'm now clearer on what the true meaning of spirituality and peace are. The void is for those of us left behind. There can be no doubt that Sunil has peaked...

Pratap Bushek: Sunil had many achievements. He ran a New York City marathon in just over three hours, and successfully swam the English Channel. He climbed some of the highest mountains in the world, including Mt. Aconcagua, and

was seriously training to climb Mt. Everest. But his greatest achievement was the love, respect and enduring *friendship that he generated* in everyone who met him.

Merrill Cassell: Sunil Davidson climbed mountain peaks in his quest for enjoying the picturesque panoramas looking over the hills, not knowing that one day soon his spirit would rise over the highest of mountain peaks and take him to Paradise Point in Heaven. Sunil is in heaven for he was so good a man. In fondest memories.

Oscar Fernandez: Throughout my 30 years with UNICEF, Sunil always stood out as one of the most pleasant and dedicated staff that I had the pleasure of working with. We lost a great friend, and we will miss him terribly. I can just see him now, his spirit soaring to the highest peak, saying to us not to be sad for him, for he had what most of us only dream about: He lived an honourable life, his way and to the fullest.

Adhiratha Keefe: Sunil brought the blue sky into our consciousness and encouraged us to fly. In the office corridor, on a city street or exiting from the icy ocean water his spirit shined. I with

his other friends and colleagues have been blessed to experience in this lifetime the path of a great soul. His daily goodness helped him to focus and remain in touch with the source of spontaneous love and affection we experienced in his presence.
